


Microsoft Edge SmartScreen Warning

Removal Options

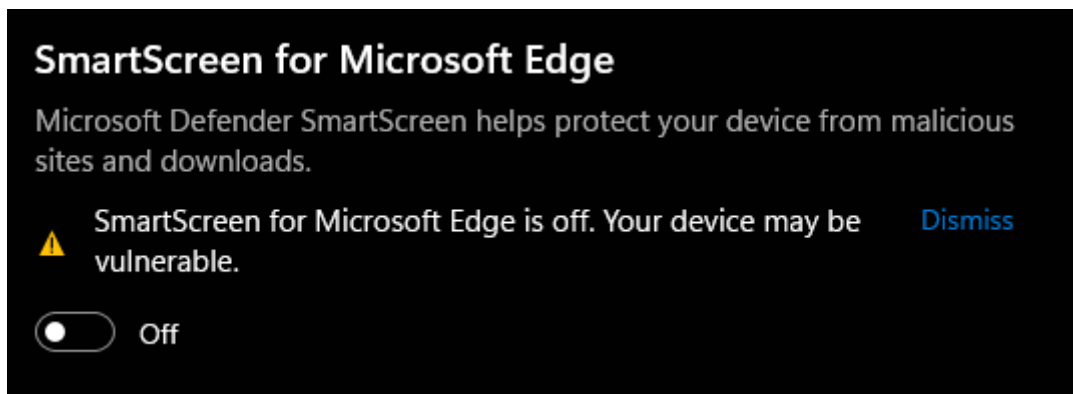
